Kierkegaard on Death. Death is inevitable and temporally unpredictable. Kierkegaard believed that individuals needed to sincerely and intensely come to realize the truth of that fact in order to live passionately. Kierkegaard accuses society of being in death-denial. Even though people see death all around them and grasp as an objective fact that everyone dies, few people truly understand, subjectively and inwardly, that they will die someday.

While Kierkegaard contemplated death, even suicide, to free himself from the inauthenticity that masked despair, preparing his soul for a leap of faith, Poe projected his anxieties into tales rife with agnosticism. In Poe's day, melancholy also had a resurgence in the cult of mourning.

Kierkegaard wrote The Sickness Unto Death under the pseudonym "Anti-Climacus," the same pseudonym under which he wrote his two most important religious works, The Sickness Unto Death and Practices in Christianity. The "sickness" in the title is despair: despair is the sickness that everyone has until they die.

The Sickness Unto Death (Danish: Sygdommen til Døden) is a book written by Danish philosopher Søren Kierkegaard in 1849 under the pseudonym Anti-Climacus. A work of Christian existentialism , the book is about Kierkegaard's concept of despair , which he equates with the Christian concept of sin , which he terms, "the sin of despair."
